Your Excellency,

We are writing to encourage you and your governments to support the Responsibility to Protect through words and actions in the upcoming 63rd Session of the UN General Assembly. The Responsibility to Protect principle and norm was one of the most important achievements of the 2005 World Summit. As you know, the Responsibility to Protect commitment emerged from the recognition by world leaders and governments that the failures of states and the international community to prevent genocides and other massive crimes against humanity must not be allowed to continue. It was not surprising that crucial leadership in the adoption of the Responsibility to Protect came from the global south, especially from government leaders from Africa and South America, and from Europe, whose countries had experienced catastrophic suffering from the commission of these crimes.

The Responsibility to Protect and other new tools for peace adopted at the summit take years of follow-through work and commitment to become operational. During the next year important consideration of the Responsibility to Protect and the fundamental principle it encompasses will occur in the 63rd General Assembly, in the Security Council and in other major UN peace, security and human rights forums.

As civil society organizations, we are committed to supporting the Responsibility to Protect and are exploring ways to organize ourselves to better assist you and your government, and the United Nations, in this important peace initiative.
